Activity 2: Colonel 'Blowface' Forbes

Background

Colonel William 'Blow-face' Forbes fought on the side of the Parliamentarians, under Lord Fairfax in the Civil War. In January 1645, whist Parliamentary forces were besieging Pontefract Castle in Yorkshire, a cannon ball passed between Forbes and Sir Thomas Fairfax.

The story of how Colonel 'Blowface' Forbes was injured by a cannon ball, reported in a Parliamentarian newspaper.

Pontefract Castle is still closely besieged by the L Fairfax his forces: Sir Thomas Fairfax was lately in great danger of being shot by a canon bullet from the castle which came between him and the Colonel Forbes; the waft of it feld Sir Thomas to the ground and spoyled one side of the Colonel's face and eyes. Our forces are in great probability of taking it and will be able no doubt speedily to requite those in the castle for their obstinacy and insolency.
